Declare pending Covid deaths by June 29, BMC orders hospitals

THE BRIHANMUMBAI Municipal Corporation (BMC) Friday instructed all hospitals to declare the pending Covid-19 toll by June 29. The civic body has also issued a notice to all hospitals directing them to adhere to the 48-hour timeline of reporting deaths due to the virus.

"In case of a failure to follow these instructions, a serious note will be taken by the municipal body and action under the Epidemic Act, 1897, will be initiated," the notice stated.

This is the second such notice to be issued by the BMC to hospitals. On June 8, Municipal Commissioner IS Chahal had issued a circular asking all medical centres to declare pending deaths within 48 hours. However, some hospitals had reportedly failed to inform the BMC about the coronavirus-related deaths within the stipulated time period.

On Friday, Chahal instructed all such hospitals to report the final toll data by 5 pm on Monday. A massive data reconciliation exercise across the state had found that till June 16, a total of 862 Covid-19 deaths had not reported by the BMC. Once a Covid-19 positive patient dies, a hospital is supposed to upload the information within 48 hours and send an email to the civic body's epidemiology cell. According to ICMR guidelines, death of any coronavirus patient has to be notified as

Covid-19 death unless the patient has terminal illness, or dies due to poisoning, accident or suicide.

To improve the process of reporting deaths, BMC will introduce Google Forms, a survey administration application, for hospitals from July 1.

In a meeting, through video-conference, Chahal on Friday also instructed hospitals to keep one-month stock of anti-viral drugs Remdesivir and Tocilizumab. He instructed hospitals to contact the manufacturers and obtain the required medicines' stock.

Recently, India has revised the protocol for clinical management of Covid-19 to include the use of Remdesivir and off-label use of Tocilizumab and convalescent plasma therapy on specific groups of patients.

Long road to recovery for discharged patients

FOR COVID-19 patients who have been discharged from hospitals, the road to recovery can still be a lengthy one with some showing long-term as well as short-term medical complications. Many recovered patients have complained of loss of taste, loss of smell, body fatigue, body pain, low blood pressure, stroke, blood sugar fluctuation and cardiac problems -- now common signs during convalescence.

Doctors across the city said apart from treating actively infected Covid-19 patients, they also have to monitor patients discharged after treatment. Patients are taking 3-4 weeks to regain their sense of taste, and longer for the sense of smell to return.

In its last meeting on

Monday, the government-appointed task force also discussed the need to have rehabilitation protocol for recovered patients on lines of what the UK is following. The National Health Service (NHS) in UK has opened rehabilitation clinics for Covid-19 patients who may have permanent lung damage.

Mumbai has a 39,149 recovered count, and the state has 77,453 people who have recovered from Covid-19.

Dr Nitin Kamik, head of medicine department in Sion hospital, said hypoxic patients, those with low oxygen saturation levels, are prone to get lung fibrosis post Covid-19. "These patients required high pressure oxygen for several days. It has scarred and damaged their lungs and this could be permanent damage," Kamik said. He is advising deep breathing, physiotherapy and yoga for better lung functions.

The task force discussed the need for physiotherapy for recovered patients at home, Kamik, also a task force member, added.

Patients, with borderline diabetes, are now noticing full-fledged fluctuation in blood sugar levels after discharge. Doctors said almost all patients complain of body pain and fatigue. Mildly symptomatic patients suffer a loss of smell and taste, tiredness after walking a short distance and body pain, while several severely ill patients who recovered are suffering from damaged lungs, thrombosis (blood clot in vessels) and need blood thinners.

"The coronavirus is devious. It is manifesting in heart, in kidneys, in lungs, through several means. I saw several urinary tract infection cases post discharge," said Dr Tanu Singhal, infectious disease expert in Kokilaben Dhirubhai Ambani hospital.

Singhal said they plan to follow up each Covid-19 patient for 3-6 months. Families are advised to keep pulse oximeters at home to measure oxygen saturation levels, help in breathing exercises and get physiotherapy for patients.

"The virus is worse in males, it tends to hibernate in them and then progresses later. I am seeing cases of myocardial infarction, stroke, kidney problems after Covid infection," said infectious disease expert Dr Om Srivastava. Srivastava said a patient's immune system, metabolism and co-morbidities also affect the recovery phase. "After discharge patients are complaining of headache, limb pain, par-

tial vision loss. Some of it is temporary, but some damages could be permanent. Vitamin D deficiency and hypertension are also factors," he said.

Dr Jalil Parkar, who is himself recuperating from Covid-19 after discharge from Lilavati hospital last week, said he and his wife both have lost sense of taste and smell. "I don't get any taste of my coffee. In initial days the appetite is low, it takes few days to grow."

In some cases, patients who are critically ill have damaged kidney functions and require dialysis. Doctors said they remain unsure whether the need for dialysis will remain life-long.

C WARD

As cases spike, BMC plans to shut down traffic in containment zones

WITH A spike in Covid-19 cases in parts of C ward which covers Kalbadevi and Bhuleshwar, the Brihanmumbai Municipal Corporation (BMC) has decided to implement strict lockdown in the containment zones of these areas, including stopping all types of vehicular traffic.

The C ward, which contains some of the most congested parts of Mumbai, has seen 930 Covid-19 patients so far.

According to officials, Marine Lines, Cheera Bazar, Fanaswadi, Koliwadi, Bhuleshwar, Kalbadevi and CP Tank areas, all located next to each other, have seen a spike in

cases with 118 cases registered in the last one week. Officials pointed out that while on June 16, in C ward there were 782 cases, on June 25 there are 937 cases.

"Areas like Bhuleshwar, Kalbadevi and Fanaswadi have seen a spike as they are congested and high density areas where many old markets and jewellery making units are located. Since these cases are coming from particular areas, we have decided to shut down traffic in some parts to contain the spread of infection," an official from the C ward said.

BMC data shows the doubling rate of C ward is 35 days which is not worrisome but officials said they don't want to take any risk as these parts are

reporting many cases.

On June 22, Assistant Municipal Commissioner of C ward Chakrapani Alle wrote to LT Marg Police station suggesting them to shut down all traffic from Sitaram Poddar Marg (Dadisheth Agyari Lane to Babasaheb Jaykar Marg). Also, traffic on Koliwadi to Bhaskar Lane should not be allowed, it said.

"In containment zones like Anantwadi, Fanaswadi and Bhaskar Lane, Covid-19 cases are rising rapidly. To break the chain of spread of infection we have to implement strict lockdown with the help of police. If any essential service shops do not follow social distancing then police will take strict action," states Alle in his letter to the police.
