These master pieces are evidence of unity in diversity and the power of collectivisation.

This will be followed by a master class in traditional tribal paintings led by the master painters.

Mukesh is making a living from his passion. Hailing from the Warli tribe in Maharashtra and currently based in Mumbai, young Mukesh makes a living selling his art and also teaching Warli painting to youngsters. He has been invited for various workshops including one invited to, by zila parishad of Palgarh, Maharashtra to impart training on Warli paintings to primary school students of 12 different schools. His tribe has been practicing folk art for over 1000 years, and he has taken on the mantle to take this tradition forward.

During the masterclass, Mukesh will teach methods of preparing base for canvas warli art and warli trees.
