Today, we have over 80 tribal films authorized in our database having reached the lives of more than 28,000 women, children and men through film screenings, competitions, workshops and festivals. The film workshops and competitions are held in partnership with School of Media and Cultural Studies, TISS.

Strength in Diversity: Stress Resistant Crops of Nagaland

The film, 'Strength in Diversity – Stress Resistant Crops of Nagaland' portrays the traditional crop cultivation of Nagaland. It exhibits the agricultural practices, including the passing of traditional knowledge from one generation to the next. It's a film purely on cultivated organic foods of Khiamniungan Naga giving some insight into stress-resistant crops, the value of traditional agriculture and inherent knowledge within the community. The film is an effort to document the literature of this ancient wisdom with the hopes of reviving traditional agricultural practices and culture.

Johar

Johar is a twenty-minute ethnographic documentary film about the daily activities and customary practices of the Adivasi group - the Santhals - dwelling in and around Jharkhand, India. The film is shot in Santhali depicting a variety of customs; traditional art and craft of the tribe, while also highlighting aspects of their lives such as rituals during birth, their means of survival, the education system and their cultural activities.

Abhijit is an Independent filmmaker and visual artist. He grew up in Odisha and moved to Gujarat to complete his graduation in Moving Images from Maharaja Ranjitsinh Gaekwad Institute of Design, MSU Fine Arts, India. From the young age of 20, Abhijit's work had taken a critical view of social, political and cultural subjects, explaining his knack for documentaries. His documentary 'Johar' (2017) based on the Santhal tribe was selected by several film festivals globally including Global University Film Awards of Hong Kong, Whakapapa Film Festival of Italy and National Institute of Rural Development of India. The film also won the best film award in Samvaad National Short Film Festival, India. He believes that the medium is powerful enough to make viewers feel unsettled, uncomfortable and liberated as it breaks the rules and invents new ones. His work aims at looking into dark corners addressing the varying themes from prejudice to human emotions.

He has published more than twenty research papers in various national and international reputed journals. He is a former member of the Bishu Maini Committee, 2016 constituted by Ministry of Tribal Affairs, GOI to investigate the tribal status of 11 hill communities of Sikkim and West Bengal.

Currently, he is serving as a faculty of the Department of Anthropology, Guwahati University, Assam. He is serves as Secretary to South Kolkata Society for Advance Research on Tribal Heritage and Welfare.
